Dear Friends,

So many of us were shocked this past week when a draft Supreme Court opinion regarding abortion rights was leaked. I will leave it to pundits to ascertain whether we should have been shocked or not; that is not my expertise.

My expertise is Jewish law, and what Jewish law tells me is that, should this ruling stand, in addition to it being a violation of the human rights for all those who can bear children, limiting access to abortion would be, as my colleague Rabbi Daniel Bogard wrote last week, "an imposition of governmental Christianity on us all... and it infringes on the religious liberty of every American Jew." (*"Supreme Court's Roe ruling would trample the religious freedom of every Jewish American."* *San Francisco Chronicle*, May 7, 2022)

My friends, as you know, Jewish law is complex and nuanced. Its core texts include minority opinions for us to see, so we can understand the diversity of perspectives of our teachers. Sometimes it can be hard to even understand what the majority opinion is on a given subject.

But not on this topic.

The religious requirement of access to abortion services has been unequivocally the position of Jewish law for thousands of years. The book of Exodus 22:22 makes clear that, from a Jewish perspective, a fetus is not a person. The Mishnah, dating from the year 200 CE, makes clear that the fetus is not considered an independent life until it can breathe on its own. The Talmud, completed some 1400 years ago, states explicitly that the fetus is considered part of the pregnant person's body. And the last thousand years of Jewish discussion about access to abortion clarifies that position, in addition to clarifying any number of situations where the pregnant person's life is in danger, mental health, and other circumstances as valid reasons for an abortion to be performed.

It is fine and fair for Christians and other religious traditions to see this issue and to understand the Bible differently than Jews. That has been one of the great and foundational principles of America. It is the purpose of the First Amendment – to protect the religious freedom of religious minorities and their free exercise of religion.

This draft decision is dangerous for all those Americans who can become pregnant. To be clear, it would not prevent abortions; it would prevent access to safe abortions. And, additionally, it would be an un-American threat to our religious liberty.

And, for those of you who are Jewish, I urge you to speak your religious truth. Say to your friends, "My religious tradition demands that those who can become pregnant must have the freedom to make choices about their bodies."

Because that's the truth.

Following is the essay submitted by the recipient of South Cook Section's 1st annual HFHS Student Award:

Please describe what you have done to help make your community a better place.

30 deliveries later, I lifted the final food basket out of the truck and walked up the pathway. Two little children shyly smiled and hid behind their mother as I placed the food in her hands. 'Thank you,' she whispered. As I walked back to the car, one of the kids ran up to me and gave me the biggest hug. At that moment, I felt more committed than ever to make sure nobody in my community went hungry. I'm passionate about community services as I have devoted 210 hours of my time to my high school Key Club, Student Government, Student Ambassador, Operation Snowball, and my local church food pantry volunteer services. This gives me a natural sense of accomplishment because I'm doing good for my community. I also love problem-solving. I've been a math tutor since my junior year and it has been a great opportunity for me to encourage excellence in math at my school and in my community through competitive opportunities and tutoring services. I have devoted 100 hours of my time to my high school Mathletes, and the Mu Alpha Theta honor society. Mathletes and Mu Alpha Theta honor society are two clubs that are meant for

students who enjoy and excel in mathematics. In mathletes, we work individually and we also compete with other schools in the same district every month. During my junior year, we qualified for the regionals and I came 2nd place in a senior/junior group competition. In Mu Alpha Theta, I like to do tutoring. As a tutor, I have had to notice what parts of teaching are the most useful, and which ones are not so appealing to that individual student. Some students like a lecture-style environment, where you talk most of the time. Others prefer lots of examples, and working through problems. In the first weeks of tutoring sessions, I tried both strategies to see which style the student seems to enjoy more or dislike less. A lot of students I have tutored have all given me positive feedback about their math skills. One of my students once said, "they feel better about math because there's always something new to figure out". Overall, it has been a great opportunity for me to be a tutor and to encourage excellence in math at my school.

Illinois State Policy Advocate Updates



ILLINOIS LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

NCJW South Cook and Chicago North Shore Sections have been very active in advocating for change during this last Illinois legislative session. We educate, coordinate, and strategize at monthly NCJW Illinois Policy Committee meetings. Our current priority issues are: Reproductive Health Rights and Justice, Voting Rights, and Gun Violence Prevention. We are also involved in Immigration Rights, Gender-based Violence and Gender Equity.

The following bills have passed both Illinois houses. Some still await Governor Pritzker's signature:

Gun Violence Prevention:

Regulate Ghost Guns: HB4383 Amendment 2 amends the Criminal Code of 2012. Prohibits un-serialized firearms. Provides a process for serializing un-serialized firearms. Provides that it is unlawful for a person to manufacture or distribute a firearm using a three-dimensional printer under specified circumstances. Provides that a first violation is a Class A misdemeanor and that a second or subsequent violation is a Class X felony.

Safe Gun Storage Campaign: HB4729 Requires the Department of Public Health to develop and implement a comprehensive 2-year statewide safe gun storage public awareness campaign. Passed both Houses.

School Code to include Gun Safety Info: HB5193 Amends the School Code to provide that every school district shall include safe gun storage information in schools' student handbooks. Passed both Houses.

Affordable Housing:

Homelessness prevention: HB2775 amends the Homelessness Prevention Act to prevent undue administrative burden in the application process for individual tenants in applying for assistance and on landlords receiving assistance payment. Passed both Houses.

Voting Rights

Accessible Vote by Mail: SB 829 enables voters with a print disability to receive and mark their vote by mail ballots. Passed both Houses

Sex Trafficking

HB5441: For purposes of the Sex Offenses Article of the Criminal Code, "unable to give knowing consent" includes when the victim takes an intoxicating or controlled substance, but the accused did not provide or administer the substance.

HB4593: Amends the Criminal Code by deleting the affirmative defense to a charge of solicitation of a sexual act with a person who is under the age of 18 that the accused reasonably believed the person was of the age of 18 at the time of the act.

SB3023: Amends the Sexual Assault Survivors Emergency Treatment Act (SASETA). Defines "follow-up healthcare" to mean specified healthcare services within 180 (instead of 90) days of the initial visit for medical forensic services. A sexual assault survivor who is not the subscriber or primary policyholder of their health insurance policy may opt out of billing their private insurance, and if the survivor opts out, then the bill for medical forensic services shall be sent to DHFS's Sexual Assault Emergency Treatment Program for reimbursement.

SB2942: Provides that in a prosecution for a sex offense, the court may exclude from the proceedings those who do not have a direct interest of the case, except the media, while a victim who was under 18 at the time of the offense is testifying, regardless of the victim's age at the time of the testimony.

Thank you to everyone who worked to lobby for these bills by opening their TAT (Take Action Today) emails and taking action. Also, thank you for filling out those witness slips while the General Assembly was in session.

Washington Institute

On May 15-17, *Debra Borodkin, Gloria Lippert, Elena Morone* and I attended NCJW's Washington Institute in Washington DC. The event is scheduled every three years, and this was our Section's chance to join with other Sections from across the United States to reaffirm our goals and project future advocacy.

Although we were unable to meet personally with our Senators and Representatives as in previous years (due to COVID), we did meet with new and seasoned Section advocates in workshops designed to foster new skills, provide new tools, advance our collective mission, and make sure our voices continue to be heard locally, statewide, and nationally.

It all culminated in The Jewish Rally for Abortion Justice, sponsored by NCJW, on the National Mall near the US Capitol on May 17th. Over 100 groups joined in sending a

We will meet on August 30th in the morning to deliver all the boxes to the post office. If you have a van we can certainly use it.



HAVDALAH AND MINI-GRANT PROGRAM



On Friday, May 20th and Saturday, May 21st, Temple Anshe Sholom and NCJW South Cook Section partnered with the Jewish United Fund in serving our community

Albine Gerson Layette Project Update

On May 25th, we began a new season of packing for South Cook Section's Albine Gerson Layette Project. It was a perfect opportunity to take stock of this well-established project.



The Project had rather modest beginnings in 1996-98, during *Michelle Tenny's* presidency, when Albine Gerson lovingly initiated the project in her basement. Albine opened her home and heart, donating endless hours and resources to get this project off the ground.

From those earlier years the demand for Layettes increased as Aunt Martha's programing grew. Over recent years, we have steadily exceeded 60 Layettes every year – except during 2021 when due to COVID 19, this project also took a necessary hiatus.

We start this year again with this lofty goal - to be able to pack about 60 of our lovely Layettes as a small reward for the young moms completing Aunt Martha's Healthy Start Program.

This means 60 plus blankets; 120 plus receiving blankets; 60 plus baby blankets; 480 plus diapers; 120 sleepers; 120 onesies; 120 plus seasonal outfits; 60 plus toys; and so much more.

From this extensive list you can readily imagine how much our Section needs each year in donations of items and funding to enable us to buy what is not donated.

Please keep this project in mind when donating to our Section, so the \$\$ are earmarked. Gently used items up to size 18 months are also welcome. We especially need snowsuits for boys and girls; hooded towels; blankets, summer hats, and bibs. Every Layette is put together by our team with great care and love!


